# "The miracle is not to fly in the air or to walk on water, but to walk on the Earth." - Chinese proverb


Dear Parents/Carers,

This week, I have truly enjoyed spending time in classes, talking to children about their learning, and looking at their work. I am so impressed and incredibly proud of their enthusiasm and dedication.

The curriculum at William Murdoch Primary School is far more challenging than anything in my day and, I would hasten to add, it is far more challenging than even a few short years ago. As a school we are continually developing our curriculum. We work with a range of leading partners including the King Edward Grammar Schools, the London based Primary Knowledge Trust's History, Geography, Design Technology and Art curriculum, Services for Education's Charanga Music curriculum and the National Association of Teachers of Religious Education's (NATRE) Discovery RE curriculum to name a few.

There is a significant amount of reading within these different curriculums, and this is no accident. We have deliberately layered reading into the curriculums to improve reading fluency, background knowledge and vocabulary acquisition. I have written many times on the importance of reading on a daily basis and encourage you to foster this with your children by hearing them read, reading to them and showing that reading matters by making a habit of reading yourself.

Our subject leads are also engaged with a programme of peer reviews run by Birmingham Education Partnership, who support school improvement work in schools right across Birmingham. We regularly commission external reviews of all aspects of the school's performance so that we can continue our school improvement journey.



# The Learning Pit

The Learning Pit explains the reality that when you learn something new, you may make a mistake, you may fail, and it may be difficult, but it doesn't mean you can't learn it. It just means you are in the learning pit and need to try again in a different way until you can get out of the learning pit. We teach our pupils that being in the learning pit is a positive thing. This is because it means that you are going to learn something new. The skills of resilience and

perseverance are key components of learning and will help you get out of the learning pit.

The UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) has urged parents and carers to take simple steps to ensure children stay healthy. With flu and norovirus circulating at high levels, reinforcing good hygiene habits is more important than ever. Recent data from UKHSA shows a rise in flu cases over Christmas and New Year. Parents should encourage children to wash hands regularly with soap and water for 20 seconds and use tissues to catch coughs and sneezes. Handwashing is the best defence, as alcohol-based sanitisers do not eliminate all germs.

Children with mild symptoms like a runny nose or sore throat can attend school, but those with a fever, diarrhoea, or vomiting should stay home and return 48 hours after symptoms clear to prevent spreading infection. Stomach bugs are highly contagious. Cleaning with soap and bleach-based products is essential, and food preparation should be avoided during illness.

Vaccination is vital against flu and other serious illnesses. Parents should ensure children are up to date with routine vaccinations and check their red book or contact their GP if unsure.

By following these simple steps, we can keep our children and school community healthy this New Year.

### **Islamic Experience Exhibition**

The children in Year 6 were hosted by the wonderful staff at the Islamic Experience exhibition on the morning of Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> and Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> January 2025. This visit was to support the RE curriculum for Year 6. The children were given 5 interactive presentations on:

- Faith and History
- Family Life
- Islam & Science
- The 5 Pillars
- Questions & Answers

The sessions culminated in a question and answer session. The 3D models of holy Islamic buildings around the world were amazing. The children were thoroughly impressed by the exhibition and were able to widen and deepen their knowledge. Many thanks to the exhibition for hosting our Year 6 pupils.





# **Club Drop-off and Collection**

We have over recent weeks noticed a small number of children being dropped off far too early for morning clubs and/or collected late from after-school clubs. Quite often these clubs are held by school staff who are generously giving their time. Where children are being dropped off before 7.55am (morning clubs start at 8.00am) or are being collected late from clubs after school (clubs finish at 4.30pm), then a warning will be given, after which the facility will be withdrawn for the academic year.

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Connecting to Class Dojo using your parent account will allow you to see the work your child is receiving and allows messaging between you and your child's class teacher. If you require another parent code, please contact the school at <u>enquiry@williammurdoch.bham.sch.uk</u>. It is important that you are connected to Class Dojo using your parent account as we utilise the instant messaging feature in Class Dojo to send important information to parents. This feature may be used to supplement information given by other means or to repeat the same information sent via email, text etc. By using different ways to deliver school information we hope to reach all those who need to receive that information in a quick, convenient and cost-effective way.

### **Height and Weight Check**

Children in Reception and Year 6 will be bringing home a letter and consent form to have their height and weight checked at school as part of the National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP). The checks are carried out by registered school nurses or trained health and care providers. Children are measured fully clothed, except for their coats and shoes, in a private space away from other

pupils. If you are happy for your child to be measured, you do not need to do anything; however, if you do not wish your child to take part or has a medical condition that may affect their height or weight, please inform your child's Class Teacher by Friday 7 February 2025.

## **Reception Vision Screening Checks**

In line with national guidance, we have been commissioned to carry out visual screening checks on reception aged children. Parents will have been provided with a consent form which gives you the opportunity to opt out of the screening test. Reception vision screening checks will take place on Wednesday 12 February 2025.

# Parent/Carer Autism Awareness Course

The Communication and Autism Team (CAT) are running an awareness course for parents/carers of autistic children or of children on the Neurodevelopmental pathway. The course has been designed for parents who want to increase their understanding of autism. The sessions will be delivered virtually via Microsoft Teams; a link will be sent to you a few days before each session. Each session will last for 2 hours. 
**Article 13:** (freedom of expression): Every child must be free to express their thoughts and opinions and to access all kinds of information as long as it is within the law.

**Article 17:** (access to reliable information): Every child has the right to reliable information from a variety of sources, and governments should encourage the media to provide information that children can understand. Governments must help protect children from materials that could harm them.

Pupils across the school focused on why is it important to listen to, learn from and celebrate people's differences in school and in our community.




### A Scientist Like Me – Shini Somara, Catherine Coe & Nadja Sarell (Illustrator)




Vivid illustrations and an inspiring narrative come together to introduce young readers to the wonders of science, observation, and problem-solving.


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#### Mr Slinn's Artist of the Week
